Re: Proposed Amendment to Georgia Pathways to Coverage Demonstration Waiver

Dear Director Portman:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on the Proposed Amendment to the Georgia Pathways to Coverage Demonstration Waiver.

The undersigned organizations represent millions of individuals facing serious, acute and chronic health conditions, including many individuals who rely on Medicaid coverage. Three in four adults enrolled in Medicaid report one or more chronic conditions.¹ Our organizations therefore have a unique perspective on what individuals and families need to prevent disease, cure illness and manage serious and chronic health conditions. The diversity of our organizations and the populations we serve enable us to draw upon a wealth of knowledge and expertise that is an invaluable resource regarding any decisions affecting the Medicaid program and the people that it serves. We urge the state to make the best use of the recommendations, knowledge and experience our organizations offer here.

Our organizations are committed to ensuring that Georgia's Medicaid program provides quality and affordable healthcare coverage. Unfortunately, the Pathways to Coverage Program has failed, leaving hundreds of thousands of people without healthcare coverage while costing the state millions of dollars to administer.² Our organizations are strongly opposed to Georgia's request for an enhanced federal matching rate for the Pathways to Coverage Demonstration, and we urge the state to not move ahead with this proposal. Our organizations offer the following comments on the proposed amendment:

Enhanced Federal Matching Rate Request and Medicaid Expansion

The Georgia Pathways to Coverage Program is not eligible for an enhanced federal matching rate of 90% because it has not expanded Medicaid to at least 133% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) previously denied Georgia's request for the enhanced federal matching rate, affirming that it will "continue the existing policy of providing the enhanced federal match rate when the state covers the entire adult expansion group, those adults up to 133 percent of the FPL."³ Under the current Pathways to Coverage Program, the state covers only a fraction (19,397)⁴ of the 184,000 individuals who would be eligible for Medicaid if the state fully expanded the program.⁵ Our organizations urge the state to not move ahead with this request, and to instead pursue full Medicaid expansion.

The evidence is clear that Medicaid expansion has important health benefits for patients with serious and chronic conditions. Research overwhelmingly shows that expansion of coverage for this population is linked with improved health outcomes for patients with chronic disease, greater uptake of preventive care, and lower overall mortality.⁶ Georgia has the opportunity to ensure access to care for thousands of individuals and to qualify for the enhanced federal matching rate by fully expanding Medicaid.

Additionally, enrollment in the Georgia Pathways to Coverage Program has largely fallen short of the state's projections. The program's current enrollment of 19,397 individuals is less than half of the projected 49,000 enrollees in the third year of the demonstration.⁷ This proposal estimates that enrollment will increase by 100,000 individuals with implementation of Public Law 119-21 requirements. However, it's not clear if the program will have any increased costs relative to the initial projected baseline, and if Georgia does exceed this baseline, it will have ample time to prepare for the adjustment.

Works Reporting Requirements and Exemptions

Our organizations remain strongly opposed to work reporting requirements, which the Georgia Pathways to Coverage Program implemented in the state years before P.L. 119-21. Work reporting requirements lead to significant coverage losses, and do not further the goals of the Medicaid program or help low-income individuals find work. Most people on Medicaid who can work already do so. According to KFF, 92% of adults with Medicaid coverage under age 65 who do not receive Social Security disability benefits are either workers, caregivers, students, or unable to work due to illness.⁸ And continuous Medicaid coverage can actually help people find and sustain employment. In a report looking at the impact of Medicaid expansion in Ohio, the majority of enrollees reported that being enrolled in Medicaid made it easier to work or look for work (83.5% and 60%, respectively).⁹ That report also found that many enrollees were able to get treatment for previously untreated health conditions, which made finding work easier. Additionally, a study in *The New England Journal of Medicine* found that Arkansas's work reporting requirement was associated with a significant loss of Medicaid coverage, but no corresponding increase in employment.¹⁰

Many of our organizations have previously raised concerns that the Program's current qualifying criteria are too narrow and prevent Georgians from accessing care.¹¹ Our organizations therefore urge the state to modify coverage requirements to include exemptions aligned with P.L. 119-21.

Conclusion

As currently structured, the Pathways to Coverage Program reaches a small fraction of eligible individuals while increasing red tape for patients. Our organizations urge the state to instead pursue full Medicaid

expansion and, at a minimum, ensure that work reporting requirement exemptions are aligned with P.L. 119-21.
